The Pastor's Corner

Every month, as I flip the calendar from one month to the next, I always marvel at how fast the previous month flew by. Now, I marvel at how fast the entire year 2019 came and went. It's not just turning the calendar from one year to the next; we now turn from one decade to the next. 2020 is bearing down on us in about 31 days.

I don't know about you; for me, when I come to a crossroads such as this, I find myself thinking not only of the past but what the future might hold. What was good about 2019? What could I say with certainty, "I sure hope that doesn't happen again." What goals did I realize in 2019; what goals on which do I continue to work; on which goals have I said, "Not this year." What are my hopes and dreams for 2020?

At a District Training Event in early November on Intentional Discipleship making, the presenters gave us five questions to ponder concerning our places of worship. When given these questions, I thought these questions were good for our entire congregation to consider. What better time than at the cusp of a New Year to reflect on why Asbury United Methodist Church is the place we choose to worship and learn about God, in addition to growing in our faith.

I see hands wrapped around the shaking shoulders of those who are going through a "rough patch." I see hands clasping music while others lift bells in joyful praise and worship. I see hands offering the bread and cup of communion to brothers and sisters in Christ. I see hands getting dirty in the gardens around the church.

Why is Asbury United Methodist Church important to me? I see feet walking in support of worthwhile organizations such as the Crop Walk and Anti-Bullying Initiatives. I see feet moving in time to a Vacation Bible School song. I see feet walking into hospital, skilled nursing facilities and the doorways of our homebound members, connecting them to their church family. I see feet walking down the aisle of the church sanctuary on a Sunday morning to share their talents with others. I see small feet hurrying to Sunday school classes while bigger feet follow them in order to teach how much Jesus loves them.

Why is Asbury United Methodist Church important to me? Asbury is the place where the Word of God is proclaimed each week, where Jesus' commands to love God and neighbor are not only encouraged but lived out in works of service and where I see lives changed through the power of the Holy Spirit. That's why Asbury United Methodist Church is important to me.



As we extend our hands of greeting at the doors to our church each Sunday morning and as we extend our hands in the passing of the peace, we *feel* **LOVE!**



Winter Safety Tips For Older Adults

Baby, It's Cold Outside! When the temperature drops, older adults run a higher risk of health problems and injuries related to the weather, including hypothermia, frostbite, and falls in ice and snow. Like most things in life, it is better to be prepared. Here are a few precautions everyone should take, especially older adults, during the winter.

Hypothermia

Hypothermia occurs when your body temperature drops to a dangerous level. This can happen when you are out in the cold for an extended time because it begins to lose heat quickly. Older adults are at an increased risk of hypothermia due to changes that happen to your body with aging.

Warning Signs: cold skin that is pale or ashy; feeling very tired, confused and sleepy; feeling weak; problems walking; slowed breathing or heart rate. Call 911 if you think you or someone else has hypothermia.

Precautions to Take

- Stay indoors (or don't stay outside for very long).
- · Keep indoor temperature at 65 degrees or warmer.
- Stay dry because wet clothing chills your body more quickly.
- Dress smart protect your lungs from cold air. Layer up! Wearing 2 or 3 thinner layers of loose-fitting clothing is warmer than a single layer of thick clothing. Think about wearing your thermals!
- Essential winter wear: hats, gloves (or preferably mittens), winter coat, boots, and a scarf to cover your mouth and nose.

Frostbite

Frostbite occurs when your body experiences damage to the skin that can go all the way down to the bone. Not surprisingly, extreme cold can cause frostbite. It is most likely to occur on body parts farthest away from your heart. Common places include your nose, ears, cheeks, chin, fingers, and toes. In severe cases, frostbite can result in loss of limbs. People with heart disease and other circulation problems are at a higher risk.

Cover up! All parts of your body should be covered when you go out in the cold. If your skin turns red or dark or starts hurting, go inside right away.

Know the warning signs of frostbite: skin that's white or ashy or grayish-yellow; skin that feels hard or waxy; numbness. If you think you or someone else has frostbite, call for medical help immediately.

If frostbite occurs, run the affected area under warm (not hot) water.

Injury While Shoveling Snow

It's one of the evils of winter – snow shoveling. If you choose to shovel, take some precautions. Remember, when it's cold outside, your heart works double time to keep you warm. Strenuous activities like shoveling snow may put too much strain on your heart, especially if you have heart disease. Shoveling can also be dangerous if you have problems with balance or have "thin bones" (osteoporosis).

Ask your healthcare provider whether shoveling or other work in the snow is safe for you.

Falls

It is easy to slip and fall in the winter, especially in icy and snowy conditions.

Precautions to Take

- Make sure steps and walkways are clear before you walk. Be especially careful if you see wet pavements that could be iced over.
- Clear away snow and salt your walkways at home, or hire someone to do it.
- Wear boots with non-skid soles this will prevent you from slipping.
- If you use a cane, replace the rubber tip before it is worn smooth.
- · Consider an ice pick-like attachment that fits onto the end of the cane for additional traction.

Fires and Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

During the winter months, it is common to use the fireplace or other heating sources, such as natural gas, kerosene, and other fuels. Unless fireplaces, wood and gas stoves and gas appliances are properly vented, cleaned, and used, they can leak dangerous amounts of carbon monoxide—a deadly gas that you cannot see or smell. These and other appliances, such as space heaters, can also be fire hazards.

Warning Signs

Headache, Weakness, Nausea or vomiting, Dizziness, Confusion, Blurred Vision, Loss of Consciousness

- · Call an inspector to have your chimneys and flues inspected
- Open a window (when using a kerosene stove) just a crack will do.
- Place smoke detectors and battery-operated carbon monoxide detectors in strategic places especially
 in areas where you use fireplaces, wood stoves, or kerosene heaters.
- Make sure space heaters are at least 3 feet away from anything that might catch fire, such as curtains, bedding, and furniture.
- · Never try to heat your home using a gas stove, charcoal grill, or other stoves not made for home heating.

Adults 65 and older are involved in more car crashes per mile driven than those in nearly all other age groups. Winter is an especially important time to be vigilant when driving because road conditions and weather may not be optimal.

Precautions to Take

- "Winterize" your car before the bad weather hits! This means having the antifreeze, tires, and windshield wipers checked and changed if necessary.
- Remember your cell phone when you drive in bad weather, and always let someone know where you are
- going and when you should be expected back.
- Avoid driving on icy roads, and be especially careful driving on overpasses or bridges. Consider alternate
 routes, even if it means driving a longer distance, if the more direct route is less safe. Often bigger roads
 are cleared of snow better than smaller roads.
- Stock your car with basic emergency supplies such as: First aid kit, Blankets, Extra warm clothes, Booster cables, Windshield scraper, Shovel, Rock salt or a bag of sand or cat litter (in case your wheels get stuck), Water and dried food or canned food (with can opener!), Flashlight, Map (if traveling in new areas)

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN REACTIVATED!

On November 11, six women met to re-establish a UMW presence in the Asbury congregation where all women are automatically members.

At this meeting, we discussed the many projects and concerns that involve women and children around the world. We were also introduced to a program called the SAFE SCHOOLS ENDEAVOR. This is a local program started by Erika Flint, former Watertown Urban Mission Director. It seeks to give grants to schools in Jefferson and Lewis counties to educate staff and students on safety-related educational programs they can implement. The women voted to send \$200 to this program and to invite Ericka Flint to speak to the congregation.

We discussed the 2020 UMW budget and approved it unanimously. Our unit is very fortunate to have an endowed budget thanks to the foresight of Mrs. Blakeslee who years ago left a portion of her estate to Asbury UMC. The UMW receives 50% of the yearly interest on the estate money. This averages \$4,000-\$5,000 yearly. Therefore, fundraising is not necessary. If anyone would like a copy of the budget, please ask Leah Mae Carlisle.

We will meet again on Saturday, Dec. 7, to fill Christmas baskets with items for our home-bound members. The Keeper of Lost Causes A Department Q Novel

by Jussi Adler-Olsen, translated by Lisa Hartford (2013)

The number one crime writer in Denmark has written a thriller about Carl Maorck who used to be one of Denmark's best homicide detectives. But he is demoted to Dept.
