Pastoral Letter: The Need to Choose

For the past many years, at least 15 years, special interest groups within the United Methodist Church have been seriously considering leaving the denomination and forming new congregations which would reflect shared theological views. Clearly the dominate sticking point has been the issue of homosexuality and LGBTQ persons. There are other issues too like: term limits for bishops to name one. But without any doubt the dominate issue has been around homosexuality and LGBTQ persons. The Methodist Church has been around since 1784 and up until 1972, there was no comment on this issue in our <u>Book of Discipline</u>, which reflects the rules of our denomination. With that publication, the <u>Discipline</u> stated that homosexuality was incompatible with Christian teaching. Since 1972, there have been increasing restrictions. The denomination forbids the pastor from officiating "same sex" weddings, or allowing such unions to occur on church property. The denomination forbids a "self-declared, practicing homosexual" from being ordained. Lesser-known restrictions are also in place, but I've listed the big ones.

Emotional debate over these issues have strained the denomination for many years to the extent, that it has impacted other ministries and missions across the denomination. Leaders on both sides of this debate have become more and more vocal at annual conferences across the country and even overseas. In some ways, It's as if we have become distilled to a "one issue" denomination.

So, for the past 5-6 years, the United Methodist Church has sincerely grappled with how to move forward as one denomination. The result decision is that we cannot move forward as one denomination. The issue of the inclusion of the LBGTQ Christian community is too important an issue for both sides. There is now a plan in place to separate the denomination into at least 2 churches. The vote to make this happen will occur at the next General Conference, which is scheduled to take place next summer in 2022. (Covid delayed General Conference in 2021, and may impact the ability to hold the conference again). But nonetheless, the decision will be made in the near future.

The proposed plan is to calmly and graciously allow those who wish the current language of our denomination to stay as church law to leave the United Methodist Church, and form a new denomination called, The Global Methodist Church. When that happens, every Ordained Pastor and every local church will be asked to decide to which denomination it wishes to belong. Those who favor the inclusion of LGBTQ Christians in the total life of the church, including ordination and Christian marriage of same sex couples, will vote to remain with the United Methodist Church. Those opposed to inclusion of LGBTQ Christians will vote to join the Global Methodist Church.

Folks, this is big! It is probably the biggest decision you will make as a congregation. And once it is made, it will be final. Such a decision should not be entered into casually and without prayerful consideration. I also believe that we should encourage conversation amongst ourselves, trying our best to really "hear" the opinions of each other before making a final decision.

I've had the luxury of knowing that this "train was coming down the track" for several years, so I've been able to grapple already with this issue. And I know my decision already. It is that which I wish to share with you.


"This will be my final news article as I am retiring at the end of December."

Pastoral Letter: The Need to Choose

I will stay with the United Methodist Church. I am at peace with my decision and base it on two streams of thought. The first is my socio-political understanding of what it means to be focused on justice for everyone. I am opposed to discrimination of any kind, whether it be race, age, creed, gender or sexual orientation. Our country has evolved since its beginning on what "all men are created equal" means to us. Had I lived in the early 1800s, I believe I would have become an abolitionist. Had I lived in the early 1900s, I believe I would have marched with Elizabeth Caty Stanton for a woman's right to vote. I was in support of the New York State's decision to allow same-sex marriage before it became supported by the Supreme Court. I simply believe every person should have a level playing field in our country. We certainly haven't achieved that goal yet, but I remain hopeful and determined.

The second stream of thought, and equally important, is my theology which is rooted in the Theology of Jesus. There are many different theologies found in the Bible, our primary source for understanding God's plan and will for us. Unfortunately, there isn't a single point of view found in scripture. The Old Testament had several specific concerns when it was written at different times and formed into what we now have as Sacred Scripture. The Epistles of Paul have another theology, as do many of the other Epistles.

It is in the Gospels, (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John), where we find the life and teachings of Jesus, our Lord and Savior. I find that I am most interested and committed to what He believed about God, about humanity, about sin, and about salvation. Jesus never mentions homosexuality, though he would have been aware of it at the time, since it has been with us since the beginning of humanity. I feel that if it had been a "hot issue" to him, he would have mentioned it. He certainly spoke often and freely about the issues that did trouble him, like double-standards, greed, indecision and judging others. Also, his ministry focused quite a bit on his concern about bringing others into the Kingdom of Heaven, including those who either lived on the fringe of Hebrew society or clearly outside of Hebrew society. Careful study of the Gospels has me convinced that Jesus was all about being inclusive, bringing everyone who was willing to embrace his understanding of what it meant to be righteous and faithful into the fold of His grace.

My decision to stay with the United Methodist Church, is mine to make as an ordained pastor. I cannot participate in the vote that will be taken by the Asbury congregation. But I can assist you in preparing for the time of decision making.

I'm suggesting that 8-12 members of the congregation, after a little training on how to create "safe environments" and navigate through difficult conversations, be given the task of forming conversation groups to discuss this upcoming vote and what it may mean for Asbury. We truly need to actively listen to one another. We've all had experiences both good and bad that bring shape to our deeply held views. We likely have close friends and family members who already belong to the LGBTQ community and feel ostracized by the church in general. We come from a variety of faith traditions, both conservative and liberal. We are not from one cookie cutter shape!

As I wrote above, I am at peace with my decision, come what may. I want every person from Asbury to be at peace with their decision as well. That won't happen if we hide our head in the sand and continue to avoid the difficult discussions that need to happen. I hope and pray that when called upon to join a discussion group, that you will enter into the conversation with sincerity and love for your fellow members. It is possible that you will be divided in your decision. That makes the need for careful listening, respect and grace to be all the more important. The most important thing for me is that each person feels respected, heard and cherished. Certainly, we can achieve this goal.

Grief Support Group to Begin December 7th

Hello Friends: This fall, I feel as if the Holy Spirit has placed on my heart the desire to offer a Grief Support Group. Many have experienced tremendous loss over the past few years, and I feel a safe place is needed to share that grief and through the support of others, learn better ways of coping and moving forward with purpose and courage. I also feel as if starting this group during the holiday season is of value.

I remember the year after my husband died, I felt so very disconnected from everyone's joy and celebrations, for I was consumed with painful feelings of loss and confusion about what my future would hold without this significant person in my daily life. It was a particularly difficult season. There was no support group near me at the time, that I knew of, and while I had the support and encouragement of family and friends, I still felt that a group of persons with similar sharp feelings of grief would have been comforting and helpful.

Elizabeth Kubler-Ross, the famed authority on the "Stages of Grief," wrote that a person typically must go through 5 stages of grief which are: *denial*, *anger*, *bargaining*, *depression and acceptance*. David Kessler, a student and colleague of Ms. Kubler-Ross, has added a 6th stage to grief: *finding meaning*. We will explore these various stages, share our stories, and look for healthy ways to move forward in living with purpose and hope.

I'm thinking that this group will run for 6 weeks, meeting on Tuesday mornings from 11:00 AM until 12:30 PM. We will meet in the church parlor.

I want to encourage anyone who has recently experienced a significant loss in their life to join. Even if it has been several years, if one feels stuck in grief, maybe this group can help one become unstuck.

A Palestinian Cry for Hope

Hope is one of the candles in this season's Advent wreath. What does Hope look like for Palestinians living in the land where Jesus was born, in the year 2021-2022?

In 2006, when my husband Gary and I, along with 50 other United Methodists, stayed in Bethlehem, I noticed some messages on the Israeli-constructed 27' (frequently designated "apartheid" wall) which surrounded the town. One message which has stayed with me said, "Is there anybody out there?" And, after our ten-day stay in Bethlehem, the United Methodist symbol of the cross and flame appeared on the wall. Are we a sign of hope?

Recent U.S. government actions supporting Israel's ongoing project of Palestinian land-taking would seem to deny such hope. A 2019 action no longer maintaining a U.S. long-held policy of condemning illegal Israeli settlements on Palestinian land in the West Bank, and a 2020 U.S. action supporting the Israeli "Peace to Prosperity" plan, which basically helps clear the way for Israel's annexation of nearly one third of the occupied Palestinian West Bank, have led to increased home demolitions, control of water resources, and destruction of olive groves and crop and grazing fields.

In the 2020 Palestinian document, "Cry for Hope: A Call to Decisive Action," Palestinians make an urgent appeal to all Christians to study and take action on behalf of Palestinians' human rights. They indicate that this is for our own integrity as Christians, saying, "We declare that support for the oppression of the Palestinian people, whether passive or active, through silence, word or deed, is a sin."


