Pastoral Letter: "Don't Look Back! You're Not Going There!"

I don't know if I ever shared that I used to have an extensive t-shirt collection with funny sayings on each shirt. I had so many that I had a full-size quilt made for my grandson Josh using just some of my old t-shirts. A favorite one of mine read, "Pretending I'm a pleasant person all day is exhausting!" People would look at my shirt and then quizzically look at me to see if I seriously felt that way. I thought it was funny.

I no longer collect t-shirts, but I still peruse them in various catalogs. One that has caught my eye reads: "Don't Look Back! You're Not Going There!"

When we think about the future of the church, we often begin by lamenting about how things "used to be." If only "blue laws" were still enforced. If only school-age sports practices and games were not on Sundays. If only people just came to church each Sunday, simply because they're supposed to. If only.....

The "If only" gets us nowhere, quite frankly. We need to be forward looking people using the contexts and tools of this present age.
