Stewart's Holiday Match



Asbury UMC recently received the notification that Stewart's Holiday Match donated \$250 to our campership program. Stewart's Shops has collected and matched donations from Thanksgiving until Christmas since 1986. Half of the check came from their generous customers and then Stewart's Shops doubles every donation.

This season, Stewart's Shops received 1,861 applications requesting over \$5 million in support, while they had just over \$2 million to donate. All Stewart's Holiday Matched funds support children under 18 years of age in the areas where the shops are located.

Our youth are most fortunate to have received the \$250 donation as part of the Stewart's Holiday Match Grant. The monies will be used to help send our 8 campers to Camp Aldersgate this summer.

Happy Easter, my wonderful friends at Asbury!



Rejoice! He Lives!

We recently completed a Lenten Bible study called, "Finding Jesus in the Psalms" and I thought it was a great study; something different. It seems that each week we gathered, not only did we become more comfortable with each other, but we had more in-depth conversation. The one that stands out the most to me is from Psalm 69, written by King David because he shared the same human conditions we share at this moment. I invite you to read it when you get a chance.

I often hear people say they would like a little "peace and quiet." I think we can all say a hearty "amen" to that, especially with all that is taking place in our world right now. Yet, I wanted to take a few moments to encourage you today on this thought of "peace."

At times, we have wrongly concluded that peace is simply the absence of conflict of any kind, yet we forget that Jesus came into a world that was filled with political and moral turmoil. Yet, He was, and IS the Prince of Peace! As Jesus walked the dusty roads, followed by his disciples, everywhere he went benefitted from the peace he brought into the situation.

Political and religious leaders may have struggled with having a sense of peace because He came to restore hope and dignity to society's downtrodden and forgotten. As He did this, the religious leaders felt their control of the people slipping away. Yet, all this time, Jesus knew a day would come that He would be taken out of this world, and His mission would be left in the hands of the disciples.

He gave some comforting words to them at the time, and I believe these words still apply to us today. John 14:27 (GNT): "Peace is what I leave with you; it is my own peace that I give you. I do not give it as the world does. Do not be worried and upset; do not be afraid." The peace that the world gives is temporary and governed by the events surrounding us, yet the peace the Lord gives is one that comes from our innermost being because of His presence.

Here is a beautiful story that illustrates the kind of peace Christ gives:

Two painters were asked to paint a picture illustrating peace. The first painted a beautiful evening scene in the foreground of a lake, its surface calm and unruffled. Trees surrounded it; meadows stretched away to the distant cattle gently browsing; a little cottage, the setting sun - all spoke of perfect rest. The second painter drew a wild, stormy scene. Heavy black clouds hung overhead; in the center of the picture, an immense waterfall poured forth vast volumes of water covered with foam. One could almost hear its unceasing roar, yet perhaps the first thing to strike the eye was a small bird, perched in a cleft of a huge rock, absolutely sheltered from all danger, pouring forth its sweet notes of joy. It is the second painter who could describe the peace that passes all understanding, which is the Lord Jesus Christ, the wisdom of God in the heart of the redeemed.

Remember that the circumstances around you should not dictate your peace. **God is our peace!**

Now that the weather is becoming warmer, and snowbirds will be returning, it's my hope we can gather together and fill the sanctuary space at Asbury United Methodist Church. There are so many of you I have yet to meet, and now we have all Spring to do so. I hope to see you on Sunday morning. *Blessings in Christ*,

WOMEN IN FAITH met on Thursday, March 14th at 4:30 PM for a wonderful presentation by Erika Flint re: The Safe Schools Endeavor Program.

The Safe Schools Endeavor mission is to "empower and support Jefferson and Lewis County students, parents, and faculty in creating the safest schools possible with a vision that every child is safe while at school." The Program was started in 2018 by Ms. Flint in response to the ongoing news of school shootings nationwide. The group is all volunteer.

Since 2018, Safe Schools Endeavor has donated \$103,326, which has funded 56 school safety projects. These are "wish list" projects that are not covered within that school's general school budget for that year. Examples of projects funded for the 2023-2024 school year are:

Belleville Henderson - Sweethearts and Heroes anti-bullying program

Carthage - Classroom calming corner & therapy toolbox

Copenhagen - "Stop the Bleed" kits and emergency doorstops

General Brown - Emergency radios for nurses and essential staff

Indian River - High School therapy dog program

Jefferson Lewis BOCES - Cell phone signal boosters to improve service

LaFargeville - Surveillance cameras for playground and parking lot

Lowville - Elementary school calming corner, emergency radios for high school

Lyme - School crossing guard coverage and training

Sackets Harbor - Retrofit school windows with security glazing

South Lewis Central - Install protective film in entrance /vestibule windows

The schools complete an application for their school specific items. The Safe School Endeavor committee then reviews the application. Then the approved application gets funded through the Safe Schools Endeavor account that is managed through the Northern New York Community Foundation. All donations go to the fund. Committee members have taken on the financial burden of things like stamps/mailings. All funds are through donations from individuals, groups, and corporations. They also have done quite a few bake sales and are always interested in people who like to bake to help make items for their bake sales.

Women in Faith will be making a \$1000 donation to Safe Schools Endeavor. On the May 4th 9:30 a.m. Women in Faith meeting, Natasha Delaney from Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) will be coming to do a presentation. CASA is one of the programs under the Resolution Center of Jefferson and Lewis Counties.

From their website - "CASA has provided advocacy services for children who have experienced abuse and/or neglect in Jefferson County since 1986. These children are either currently in or at risk of entering the foster care system. CASA's best-interest advocacy helps ensure that children are safe with a permanent home and the opportunity to thrive. Our trained volunteers are appointed by the Jefferson County Family Court Judge and are expected to stay with their assigned case until the child(ren) reaches permanency. Through collaboration with legal and child welfare professionals and additional service providers, CASA ensures the judge has the needed information to make the most well-informed decision for each assigned child."


Items can be left in Wesley Hall from 10-2 daily or after church service on Sundays.


